







Incorporating Patient Preferences into Emergency Incisional Hernia Guidelines: A Patient Survey Study

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AIMS

Incisional hernias pose a significant challenae for patients healthcare providers. Our aim was to provide evidence informed, transparent recommendations for treating emergency ventral hernias. ensuring that patient preferences were considered in the decision-making process and incorporated into the Guideline development.

Inclusion questions:

"Do you (now or in the past) have a ventral or incisional hernia?"

"Did you have an emergency repair of that hernia? "

> "Infection and being able to return to current level of function."

METHODS

Engaging Patient Perspectives:

- Google Form Questionnaire shared via social media:-Low response rate (n=8)
- Facebook Poll to simplify *auestions* outcomes:- High response rate (n=95)

Patients were asked to rank surgical outcomes such Surgical Site Infection (SSI), surgical site occurrences (SSO), mortality, reoperation, recurrence, length of quality of life (QOL), and major general morbidity based on their importance in the short

RESULTS

Top 3 Patient-**Prioritised Outcomes:**

- Maintaining bowel function: 24%
- Quality of life (work capacity, absence of chronic pain): 23%
- Risk of mortality: 20%.

CONCLUSIONS

Patients want to be heard and informed!!


Consider what is QOL:

Pain, Recovery, SSI, Other
